## A Gourmet Campfire in the Vic High Country

where thoughts of Queen's and Sir Laurence Olivier meet Deer Hunters and 4WD's....



The florescent pink "Woolley bugger" and "Rainbow worrier" sound more like costumes from "Pricilla Queen of the Desert", rather than the appropriate fly for a trout at the opening of the season. But the Goulburn River had been stocked with farmed Rainbows who will only rise up to such colourful glittering objects.

This weekend, as my swag was strapped onto the tarpaulin of a pumped up 4WD heading into the high country with a group known as "The Southern Fly Fishers", a Parachute Adams with a black beaded Nymph tied underneath was the order of the day and the only Drag I was expecting was from my Sage reel as a big wild Brown takes off into a bubbling stream to be dispatched and cooked over a red gum fire that night...

Devoid of fish on our first day, my attention was drawn to others on our campsite by the Wonnangatta River, and to my delight there was a bacchanalian feast emerging from the esky's and car fridges of the assembled fishermen. Our first night entrée included Wagyu pastrami, Spanish spiced sausage, French brie, Kalamata olives, King Island blue with quince paste and Barossa Valley Pheasant Farm pate that sat quite nicely with my Mersey Valley Cheddar and 10-year-old pickled walnuts from my tree in Launceston, all washed down with a James Boags Premium.







I was told my host had "rather a good bottle of red saved for the occasion" and steak was planned for the evening, so a quick trip to the Prahran Market secured two 28 day dry aged on the bone Angus rib eye steaks, yellow waxy kipfler potatoes from the organic veg shop and Mr Pike "The Mushroom Man" provided us with the last of the seasons fresh wild local Morels that would prove to be a perfect accompaniment cooked in cream, onions and garlic for the 1998 Lakes Folly Cabernet Sauvignon from the Hunter Valley. Later, when the coals had settled, a Rum and raisin damper (1/3 of a bottle of Bundy... I'm reliably told by the maker) was baked in a Dutch Oven and a bottle of Jameson's Whisky, slightly creamy in

taste from being matured in old Stout Barrels was shared with coffee and banter before hitting the sack feeling no pain and looking forward to the next day on the water.

A beautiful day unfolded in the Valley and a breakfast of fried bacon and eggs on campfire toast fortified the system for the bumpy ride on a 4WD only track to the Moroka River. I saw another side to my accountant friend on that track as he pulled out a chainsaw to remove a tree from our path, slipped the 4WD into low gear up almost vertical rocky, muddy mountainside whilst dressed in camouflage gear and later covered my face in something called a "Buff" that one would normally see on grainy footage from the Middle East. I was in his domain now and this is where years of staring at spread sheets trying to make the numbers add up would finally be reconciled, I was in safe hands...

Our traveling companion on this occasion was the wife of the damper chef who was wearing a bright Hi Vis Orange T-shirt (more about that later...) who enjoyed a hike up the mountain, swam in the river, encountered a water monitor and a deer's foreleg in the bushes while we fished up river from where the road ended abruptly. We spent 4 hours in the most pristine, crystal clear water imaginable, with deep pools, stony outcrops, pebbly wooded sections with mayfly's dancing in the light like fairies in a glen and still no fish. We stopped by a campsite with a pit toilet (Luxury...) and walked over a wooden wire suspension bridge looking for a "bridge trout" as I'm told by our leader "every bridge has a trout", but to no avail. That night by the campfire started as a solemn occasion with no talk of "the one that got away" but there was light on the horizon....

We consoled ourselves with a chilled tin of Captain Morgan and Coke followed by a spicy Malaysian Chicken Curry and Rice in "Sous Vide" plastic pouches served with buttered broccolini and a bottle of Devils Lair Chardonnay from the Margaret River WA. For us, it was as Queen Victoria remarked on the conclusion of her meal at a remote Scottish Inn "no Pudding and no fun" until my friends' mates who had driven up for the night produced a cooking implement more like something bought by Darth Vader from the Death Star to cook on, but its multiple level black metal plates swung into positions on the fire inaccessible before. In a shot, out came mixed grills, potatoes cooked in their jackets, field mushrooms sizzled in butter, peas cooked in their freshly opened tin (oxymoron I know...) and 2 heavily marbled Sirloin steaks as big as the grill itself rekindled our evening. Their passion for dessert bought a pot of river water onto the fire to cook the individual sticky date pudding with butterscotch sauce, spaceman like squeezy tube of custard and Western Wagon Wheel biscuit crumbled over the top that replicates the chocolate "soil" you see on molecular dining plates in modern restaurants these days... Queen Victoria would be pleased.

The silence of the valley was shattered for a time by the sounds of a small group of young deer hunters from Maffra in an adjoining campsite who's pulsating techno sound system, circle work in the paddock with their spotlights cutting the blackness of the night sky and firing off the occasional 308 was quickly silenced by a flask of Gentleman Jack and a comfy swag to dream the night away under the stars.

The next morning, after the obligatory eggs and bacon, we packed up camp, bid farewell to old friends and new, then headed down the road via the shortcut (it's actual name) to the famous Dargo Hotel which is a real Alpine Pub that last time my accountant friend stopped

by was ringing to the sound of a stockwhip and cattle being herded down the main street. Now 11am on a Sunday morning may sound early to have a beer but this seemed a totally appropriate time to toast a great weekend had by all, even if we did not catch any fish....



I will leave this story with my top 5 little known High-Country facts, if you wish to follow in my footsteps –

- 1. Accountants are not all "boring bean counters" but can be serious gastronomes which under their innocent façade hide a Rambo or Bear Grills waiting to come out.
- 2. Sporting Clubs can be real fun with wise men and women who are happy to share their knowledge of their craft, cheese and whisky if you are lucky.
- 3.
