If you develop symptoms after a visit to the Club Rooms, please get tested and if you are positive, advise a Committee member immediately. Similar rules apply to trips — if you have symptoms, do not join Club Members on a trip and if you develop symptoms after a trip then get tested and if you test positive, let a Committee member know.

Fly Fishing Courses

The SFF Club recognises that there are members who would like to expand their fly-fishing knowledge or improve their skills in one or more aspects of the sport and that the same desire to learn probably exists in people who would like to take up the sport and join the Club.

To this end, the Club will be running a comprehensive trout-focused fly-fishing course for current members in mid-February. The course will be run at the SFF Club rooms over four nights and consecutive weeks (dates and times to be confirmed).

The course will be run by Rob Casamento; developed and instructed by Club members, including our certified casting instructors.

Content will include:

- Understanding rod, line, leaders, and tippets
- Casting techniques
- Fly choice
- Setting up for fishing dries, wets, and nymphs
- 'Stream-craft' for creeks, rivers and lakes

It is the goal that at the conclusion of the course, members will have the skills to participate confidently in club trips, and a fishing trip to an appropriate location will be organised. The course will be free to members, with the only requirement being that they renew their annual membership for 2021/22.

It is not meant to replace other specialty courses that will continue to be run separately such as euro-nymphing and fly-tying.

Looking ahead, the course will also be offered to people wishing to take up the sport or who are new to it. Club equipment will be provided to those who do not have rods etc. The courses will be free to them, provided they join the Club.

Included in the gathering were two of the Club's newest members – John Esson and Dave Miller and it was great to see them.

The tension across the group was palpable with the prize of a few hard - earned trout from different locations across the Noojee catchment area on offer.

Tony and Chris Mastwyk ventured to the Loch river, spurred on by their desire to hop over huge logs and bow and arrow cast at poor defenseless fish. The trout clearly didn't have a chance!

Ray and John Esson chose the middle beat of the Toorongo with John determined to expand his expletive vocabulary in the company of the club bon viveur. From all accounts, he wasn't disappointed.

Allan, Chris Ormerod and Malcolm Green favoured the gentler pastures of the Noojee car park alongside the La Trobe river.

Grant took Jeff Allen up into the falls and Dave Miller chose bridge number one on the Falls Road, upstream on the Toorongo.

Grant and Jeff chalked up two fish at the falls both to dries.

Dave Miller had one fish on a Czech nymphing set up and Dean had two but found conditions very challenging. John Esson came back with a much-enhanced vocabulary care of Ray. Ray took three pampered fish on a rainbow warrior and John took one fish in the afternoon.

Rumour has it that no less than five disenchanted Southern members ventured to the trout farm but lost patience there after a relatively fruitless hour.

At 5 pm we all gathered in the Toolshed pub, quaffing cool beers and eating a variety of good fayre on a lovely evening in the Alpine Region.

We were joined briefly by Ross who took an amazing tally of twenty fish in two hours on bridge no 3 on the Falls Road, primarily using three types of caddis flies. Well done Ross – we all knew there were fish about!

It was a wonderful social gathering and it felt great to be out and fishing with fellow Club members.



Hard Fishing, the 'Duck' is for sale and all this could be yours! Omeo Region Trip Report, 20-23 Nov

Two of my sons have done school rowing, one after the other – the second one is now in his final season. Coincidentally, I've not been active or have been on a club trip for about eight years.

Peter Suzic asked me if I would mind leading this trip and, as the high-country area around Anglers' Rest is one of my favourites, I readily agreed. This was followed by several emails and phone calls along the lines of: "Yes, I'm coming on the trip; by the way, who the hell are you?" and after a late date change to allow for Covid restrictions to ease, the date was set for 20-23 Nov.

Ross B, Les P and Geoffrey C were heading up during the prior week and agreed to report on conditions for us.

Friday

Friday morning was a relatively quiet trip out of post lockdown Melbourne, with fine weather and green fields as far as the eye could see.

Ross, Geoffrey and Les reported fishing several rivers. Most rivers held fish but they were deep and not looking up (particularly the Mitta); there were some exceptions in the Cobungra and the Gibbo. Euro Nymphs seemed the best bet – fishing was not to be easy. Grant D, Gerard C and Alistair all arrived at the Hilltop Hotel around midday. Ray G, David P, Allan R, Graeme C, Carol, & Peter T and Alex H (New member) arrived afterwards. Alistair, Grant and Gerard departed to check out the Cobungra Access point marked on the maps from the Northern boundary of Dinner Plain Airport. Whilst the first 1km is navigable

by 4WD, it becomes a walking track for approximately the next 3km, over hills and into the valley. There's reputedly good fishing in there, however Friday was not the day for it. The excitement of the day proved too much for Alistair and Grant, who returned to the Hilltop for a nana nap. Gerard set off to the Hinnomunjie Bridge area of the Mitta Mitta and caught 3 smallish trout by Euro Nymphing. Later, at the Hilltop, several local farmers were overheard complaining as to where they were going to store all the hay they had cut. Over dinner at the Hilltop we hatched our plans.

Saturday

The day was expected to be fine and 30-31 Degrees. Most of us met over breakfast to discuss the day. Allan and Graeme had already left for the Bundarra where they intended to eat.

We paired up Ray & David, Carol & Peter, Grant and Alistair, with Gerard solo. Alex was turning up a little later.

Allan and Graeme were located in the Bundarra Valley seated at a table with everything but the white tablecloth, tucking into their bacon and eggs on the bank where they intended to fish. Unfortunately, they had parked close to the gate which resulted in an unscheduled meeting with the farmer who informed them it was a bad place to be parked if he was moving cattle. Message to team - don't park near gates!

Ray and David, took the advice to avoid the expected crowed banks of the Mitta Mitta and tributary streams and immersed themselves in the beautiful surrounds of the Gibbo River, downstream. This was not much over half an hour's drive away.

It perplexed them as to why, save for a solitary fish wrangled by David, they produced nothing else. The following day they learned that a dozen or so friends from one of the local flyfishing clubs had visited that section of river they fished the day before. No wonder it was seemingly bereft of fish. It was to become a common theme for the weekend.

Grant and Alistair went over McCoy's and Mt Battery Tracks to fish the Cobungra. After initial success with fish rising to stimulator patterns, Grant touched two and Alistair landed one – the middle of the day stopped the action. Later in the day they went to have their first look at the Gibbo. It looked dark and fishless in the mid-afternoon.

Peter & Carol Trevissino focussed their efforts around Middle Creek where Carol was able to easily watch Peter fishing. Carol is thinking of buying a rod and joining Peter on the water. Peter saw signs of life in the water but did not land any fish.

Gerard fished the Mitta from Joker Flat, using a variety of methods, finding it to be relatively clear and got to really test out some rods he made during Covid iso. He loves his 10' 2wt, catching a few fish of okay size and a few smaller. Usually Euro nymphing, Gerard finally learnt the art of fishing dry flies to sipping trout on 7X tippet from Gary M; a blast on the 2wt 10' rod at Middle Creek Camping ground.

Grant and Alistair took Callaghan's Rd, McCoy's then Mt Battery Tracks across to the Cobungra where they found clear water and immediate noises of fish rising. Grant quickly dropped two and Alistair caught a 1.5 pounder before things went quiet soon after 11am, despite heading up river for over a kilometre.

Sunday

Sunday was again expected to be around 30 degrees but with some instability and a likely thunderstorm in the afternoon. Allan and Graeme set off to Bright via the Victoria river. They later fished the Buckland, stayed at Porepunkah caravan park then home Monday.



Dave had a sore back, so he and Ray decided to take in some of the sights of the Mitta Mitta valley and around Mount Hotham which neither of them had seen in forty years. Some great and seriously ancient memories were recounted - a wonderful time. It surprised Ray as to how many people had come to the region. He met three he knew . . . simply extraordinary. Clearly the exodus from the city was high on the agenda of many.

Gerard and Alex paired up to cross McCoy's and Mt Battery and fish the Cobungra, where Gerard caught a brown on dry of ~1.5 lb with the last drift. They then moved to the Mitta where Gerard thought he was doing okay Euro nymphing upriver from Joker campground, catching a fish while a trio of Puddle Pirates (competition fishers) walked past.

He felt a little despondent soon after when they told me they had caught 20 (each!) Bye and bye, a terrific time with an opportunity to meet new members along with those who had been less active in recent years. I do look forward to expanding the experience on future club trips.

The day started sunny but became overcast, which increased with the humidity until the storm broke to not very much local rain. Grant and Alistair searched for fish in the Bundara Gorge (upstream from the highway bridge) where grant spotted a nice 2+ lb fish in a slow run, which Alistair was able to hook with a stimulator.


Alistair spotted a fish about to take Grant's fly in a similar pool – he spotted it too late to warn Grant as it appeared vertically rising from the black depths to a stimulator. These fish were deep, but they were looking up.

In the final build up to the storm, there were good hatches of caddis particularly, with fish rising well to them. As soon as the storm broke, the caddis disappeared and with them the fish.

On their return to the cars, they bumped into Donald Beveridge of Bundarra Cabins who passed on his regards to Southern – we've used his accommodation on previous trips. A team Dinner was held that evening at the Golden Age Hotel.

Monday

Monday was for the return home for most and there were tropical volumes of rain midmorning to add some challenge to the trip.

Southward Ho & Up the Mountain

The continuing adventures of Dave Reid in New Zealand

After many weeks of lockdown in Victoria and then planning, travelling from Melbourne, arriving in Auckland, being whisked off and quarantined in Hamilton - the freedom and relaxed atmosphere told me I was back in New Zealand.

We drove down the North Island, staying in Taupo for a night where I fished a small tributary. Finding a spot was more difficult than expected in mid-week with plenty of people but it wasn't nearly as bad as the Goulburn on a good day! The first spot I tried had an old boy setting up and we got talking. On his first cast - bang! A nice 5lb rainbow in full spawning colours. Needless to say, that whetted the appetite and after discussing flies and tactics I jumped into the car and headed upstream to a spot he recommended. I only had a couple of hours to fish and the spot had cars parked at it – damn tourists! We went for a walk to see if we could see anything, with my wife walking ahead. She spotted a pool full of trout and came running back. Sure enough, it was like a David Attenborough documentary on Alaska - about forty plus fish doing their thing. I just started casting and wading regardless of my lack of waders and the freezing cold water. It was engrossing, the fish didn't spook but just moved aside with every cast. It was amazing to see rainbows refuse everything in 3ft of water - from eggs to Ray's favourite, the RW. I then got a job call and had to leave but needless to say (like the Terminator) I will be back.

We continued south and there was an air of excitement when we arrived in Christchurch just in time for opening. I won't bore you with those details as my purpose was my trip south for the opening of the high country and fishing Southland.

We left Christchurch, heading for Alex in the south. The weather gods had blessed us and apart from snow on the hills, it was looking good on the met forecasts we have come to trust. With neither maps nor a plan, we 4 intrepid anglers had decided to fish Southland and surrounds for a week then head back north to meet up with the Canterbury fly fishing clubs' annual "big" trip to Twizel where 30 anglers would be fishing for the weekend.

First stop for 2 of us was Lumsden. The weather could not have been better as we made a few purchases with Trev at Hurley's and headed out. Note to self, Lumsden wasn't the best for us - the Riversdale pub was better value and closer to rivers. It served better food and had rugby and other sports on the TV which were high on our agenda après fishing. On day one we went on the Mataura but it was slightly high and discoloured due to the snow, making site fishing difficult and not what we were there for. We pulled the pin quickly and headed for a tributary we knew. It was clear as a bell with normal flows. We observed a truck at the top bridge so dropped to the lower and fished up from there. It was hard going, seeing no fish in the main river at all and I had the feeling we were stirring someone else's porridge. We were not seeing any fish which was worrying but eventually I got a bit of luck when I spotted and followed a side braid which opened out a little and there I found a nice fish feeding. It was quite fussy and didn't look at much and ate nothing. We couldn't work out what it was going for but it was still feeding. My mate Mike and I threw the box at it, even the wiggly worm but no luck! I then saw quite a big spinner and looked into my box for my big version of a pheasant tail - size 6. Yes, 6! I had tied something up after seeing a hatch of big flies on a small stream years ago and caught quite a few fish from the pool on my next visit. So here goes nothing I thought as I tied her on. First cast, the fish followed it 6 feet down stream. Next cast, bang - hooked it. It jumped, ran then spat the hook and to our

amazement, went back on station unfazed? So, cast again, hooked it again and this time it was hooked well.



After several seconds this fish ran up stream then turned and made a b-line for me downstream. I was stripping and moving back as fast as I could and this fish was getting bigger and bigger as it approached me. It was way too fast, went round a snag and ping, it was gone. Needless to say, it was at least 8 pounds on the Tony H scale. It was the only fish we saw.

We found out later we were following a couple of guys with an hour or 2 start which on a small river is not so forgiving.

Next day we headed for the Aparima and it was in great shape. Weather was a bit overcast but the sun eventually came out and we could spot. We spotted and cast to many fish but they were extremely spooky, like the fish the day before. One fish we threw the box at again and I eventually hooked on the wiggly worm only for it to have taken the trailing bit of rubber and pulled that off. The scenery was fantastic but it was tricky fishing and I left it, doubting my fishing skills and if I had lost my mojo as I could not land a fish on a river which should have produced a few to the net.

Next stop was Ranfurly to meet up with the rest of the crew. After a few libations and a late night of frivolity in the resident's lounge we decided to have a crack at a few lakes which can hold extremely good numbers and big fish. After a hearty brekkie we set out for lake 1. A dam similar to Millbrook in size with brown cruising and taking off the top. A lot of fun was had casting and catching rising fish. The other lakes are a lot bigger and were very high and challenging. We pulled a few more fish from them but our hearts were set on the rivers so the next day we fished a river which is at best in early season with the rainbows dropping

back pretty quick after spawning. We had a great day. A long walk, beautiful surrounding with wild deer crossing the river in front of us and many pools with rainbows. The fish again were strangely spooky on a river which gets fished very little but this trend followed us nearly everywhere we went. Very strange indeed! Anyway, we did succeed on nymphs, no dries and the Mojo had returned. The other rivers in the area were again slightly high and dirty and from the river flows we could see better water in the Mackenzie country so we upped sticks and headed over.


Our first stop was a tributary and we arrived to find an old club member just about to get into his waders, a real character standing telling us what was happening in his Y fronts and singlet. He said there were heaps of people and that he and a couple of other members, one an exceptional fisherman, were going downstream to walk back up so we could go upstream. We agreed but said we may walk down past them and fish up behind if the upstream beat was no good and if he agreed, which he did.



We sat down for a brew waiting for the sun to hit the water and had a chat as he headed off to join the others. While sitting there, 2 utes came past. One guy stopped, asking us is it always so busy as there were people everywhere and he had seen 6 in a party all fishing up. Too many really for a small stream unless they were very patient. He shot off downstream but the other ute went upstream - which I had a bad feeling about.

When the sun hit the water, we started and saw fish immediately. The water was slow and the fish in the pools had plenty of time to inspect our flies. We fished on, getting the odd fish and getting broken, knowing there was better water up ahead and that the fish would be heading into the riffles soon so maybe some dry fly action. As we turned the bend our

jaws dropped - the feared white ute! The dirty illegitimate had jumped us! Dirty so and so. It really does drop your faith in fly fishermen. It was a work ute so we took the number and will call his work to see if he was on work time etc. This was the polite action we thought about - you can imagine the rest. We left him a note too, NOT HAPPY!



Anyway, rant over, we pulled the pin, walked down past the old boys fishing up looking at all the big fish from our vantage point. Long story short, we fished up, catching a lot of fish and some on the dry as they moved into the riffles. Everyone caught and we were all happy. So on to Twizel.

We met at the RSL and after drinks and catch ups we retired to our allocated houses. We usually stay at the home of Steve Carey, the local guide but he has retired and there was something wrong with the house. Steve was around, as he usually is, with a drink in his hand and he reckoned the Tekapo was the best he had seen it in many years and he was right. The flows had been isolated to 2 real braids/channels on the left going up from the iron bridge with nothing on the other side and no didymo in either braid which was unbelievable. The fish were rising and there were lots of them and for a change, not too fussy. We fished all around and had good days fishing. Our last day was saved for the best.

We rose early with anticipation of many big fish. We were going into the headwaters of a renowned river which people rarely get access too without a guide and a helicopter. With the stories of the past running through our heads, we got access and drove in (my helicopter having developed technical problems!) The convoy inched along the 4wd track on a stunning morning, with the mist starting to lift and the sun beating down. Further and further we drove into the hills and when we arrived, the rivers were stunning. Some would fish here,

some there and we would go exploring over the hill. We headed off, across street falls and swampy land till we eventually found a track that went up. In fact, it went up and up and continued up out of sight. Hmmm, was this a good idea? It was marked but some small trees growing on the track indicated it was not a regular route. Ahh, to hell with it we are here and we started to climb. Up and up we went, heads firmly on the headrests and backs in the seats. The front of the car looking into fresh air was disconcerting but at 1200m it plateaued and the view was magnificent. At one point I thought I saw an Air New Zealand jumbo flying below us - it felt that high. Our biggest concern was controlling the descent but fortunately we were in a 100 series Cruiser and it coped better than us with the steep declines and the sheer drops.

We parked up and got ready. The water looked amazingly clear with nice glides and beautiful blue pools. We walked a few meters and I spotted 2 rainbows. My mate Tim cast and picked up one and the other bolted. He got a nice jack about 3lb. That was the last fish we saw or spooked. We walked and spotted in very fishy places but nothing. We cut our losses and returned to the others further down only to find them walking out not having seen a fish. We were all gutted. Two of the other boys had a big 4wd as well and got into some but again nothing like the myths and legends lauded to - but I suppose that's why it is called fishing.

As we discussed things around the cars I thought there must be something here somewhere, so I strolled downstream to a small confluence pool and managed to spot and hook a brown of about 5lbs. I was happy with that after a great adventure with friends in the high country.

What I take from the trip is that you need to be flexible when you are fishing and you must be prepared to move or travel or whatever as you never know what obstacles will pop up to try and spoil your fun.

My next big trip is in December into the Canterbury high country but that may change with time – I cannot wait.

Members' Bargain Table




At each General Meeting Night (4th Wednesday), there will be a table set up for Members to offer items for sale/auction.
